


Hearing Loss in Children



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The Early Childhood Hearing Outreach (ECHO) Initiative is part of the National Center for Hearing Assessment and Management at Utah State University. The ECHO Initiative focuses on extending the benefit of periodic hearing screening to children 0 – 3 years of age in a variety of health and education settings. We also serve Early Head Start programs as the National Resource Center on Early Hearing Detection and Intervention.

Our goals are to ensure early childhood education and health care providers have:

- Up-to-date information about recommended Otoacoustic Emissions (OAE) hearing screening practices;
- Tools to effectively implement OAE screening so that children with hearing health needs are identified as early as possible and provided with appropriate follow-up services and support; and
- Strategies for using hearing screening as an opportunity to promote receptive communication and language development in all children as an integral part of school readiness.

Timely Diagnosis: A Resource Guide Supporting TeleAudiology

I. Introduction

Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) systems work to ensure that infants are screened by 1 month of age, diagnosed by 3 months of age, and connected with early intervention services by 6 months of age – known as the 1-3-6 goal. Unfortunately, almost half of infants who do not pass their newborn hearing screening are "lost to follow up", often due to the difficulty in accessing an audiologist with the needed pediatric expertise. This is particularly a challenge for families who live in rural and remote areas, hours from a pediatric audiologist.



Role of Tele-Audiology

Tele-audiology (T-A)- the implementation of audiological services via telehealth technologies –has great potential to ensure that infants who are in need of diagnostic audiology services can receive them in a timely manner.

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Tele-audiology resource guide

- Provides a toolkit to share lessons learned and recommendations for conducting remote diagnostic audiological evaluations with infants
- Based on experiences of professionals in 6 states and 1 Canadian province
- Serves as a catalyst to ensure EHDI systems meet the needs of their infants and their families





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

Hearing screening is a test to tell if people might have hearing loss. Hearing screening is easy and not painful. In fact, babies are often asleep while being screened. It takes a very short time - usually only a few minutes.

If you are visiting this site for the first time, it may be because your baby has been referred for a second hearing screening test or for follow up hearing testing.

It is important to know that many babies need a repeat screening test. It does not necessarily mean your baby has a hearing loss. A newborn with normal hearing may fail the first screening due to debris in the ear canal, fluid in the middle ear or moving/crying during the test.

Follow up testing is very important. If your baby does have hearing loss, it is important to catch it early. Babies begin to develop speech and language in the earliest months of life. If families know about a baby's hearing loss, much can be done to encourage communication development.




