



#### **ABSTRACT REVIEW PROCESS**

Through the abstract review process, the Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) Annual Meeting strives to provide key stakeholders an opportunity to identify areas of concern, promote collaboration, and share best practices. EHDI Meeting participants range from state and local programs to the federal level and from academicians to families.

The Meeting goals are to enhance the implementation of comprehensive state-based EHDI programs and improve EHDI services. This includes current research and research methods related to EHDI, cultural competence of providers and assessment of their abilities to work with children who have hearing loss, their families and communities and enhancing and creating new and ongoing working relationships.

The abstract review process ensures that the top presentations and posters are included in the EHDI Meeting. Through this process, reviewers provided the ranking and important comments to aid Meeting organizers in putting together a strong Meeting agenda.

During the abstract submission process for the 2015 EHDI Annual Meeting, there were over 200 abstracts submitted. Each abstract was submitted in one of 10 tracks. Abstracts were selected based on the recommendations of the 2015 EHDI Annual Meeting Abstract Review Committees, which were made up of EHDI stakeholders from across the country who volunteered their time. Each abstract was reviewed independently by three members of the individual track committees and was scored according to criteria established by the EHDI Annual Meeting Planning Committee. This scoring criteria is posted each year when the abstract submission process opens for the EHDI Annual Meeting.

#### **ABSTRACT REVIEW SCORING CRITERIA**

Abstract submissions were reviewed and scored according to the following criteria by the Abstract Review Committees.

#### 1 - 20 Points

Relevance and significance to the early identification of hearing loss and early intervention services for infants and young children with hearing loss and their families.

- The abstract should address a current topic and information appropriate for the purposes of the EHDI Annual Meeting goals.
- The abstract should address important issues or gaps related to improving state-based EHDI services.
- The abstract should inform, enable, or update others in improving EHDI services regarding potential issues related to clinical practice, education of professionals/families, or future research.
- The abstract should have the potential to advance the practice/knowledge base of EHDI.
- The abstract should expand the discussion or perspectives to build on existing knowledge or address new knowledge, discoveries, methodologies, tools, technologies, or practices.

#### 1 - 10 Points

#### Overall clarity.

- The abstract should be well written and organized in a coherent manner.
- The amount of information to be presented should be appropriate for the proposed session length and format.
- The abstract should clearly describe the presentation's goals and learner outcomes.
- The abstract should provide prospective participants enough information to determine if the session will meet their needs.
- If research results are included, they should be clearly described and supported by statistical findings with the conclusions supported by the results.


## USING QUALITY IMPROVEMENT METHODOLOGY IN EHDI PROGRAMS

All EHDI programs are expected to use quality improvement (QI) methodology to improve their programs. Many sessions and posters at the 2015 National EHDI Meeting focus on how EHDI programs have used QI methodology. We encourage you to attend as many of these sessions as possible to learn more about how you can use QI methodology in your state's EHDI program.

Successful use of QI consists of addressing three fundamental questions and engaging in small tests of change known as Plan-Do-Study-Act cycles.

#### **Three Fundamental Questions**

- What are we trying to accomplish? The improvement team develops a specific, time-limited, and measurable aim statement
- How will we know if a change is an improvement? The team identifies process and outcome measures to collect over time to track improvement and evaluate progress
- What changes can we make that will result in improvement? The team identifies ideas for changes to try out



#### Tests of Change: Plan-Do-Study-Act (PDSA) Cycles

PDSA cycles are used to rapidly test changes in real world settings by planning a change (Plan), trying the change (Do), observing the results (Study), and acting on what is learned (Act). Teams use PDSA cycles to test changes (initially on a very small scale in order to minimize risk), quickly identify promising ideas, and build confidence that the changes are leading to improvement. Changes that show promise are expanded and tested on larger and larger scales, until the team is confident that the change should be adopted system wide.

#### Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence

The **Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence** honors the career achievements of Dr. Antonia Brancia Maxon in promoting effective EHDI programs for all newborns, infants, and young children. Dr. Maxon was a visionary in EHDI programs, beginning with her leadership in the Rhode Island Hearing Assessment Project in the late 1980's. She was one of the first to recognize the feasibility and value of universal newborn hearing screening and was a tireless advocate for connecting screening programs with timely and appropriate diagnosis and early intervention.

Her extensive contributions to creating excellent EHDI programs were abruptly ended by a tragic automobile accident in May of 2007. In memory of her contributions, an **Award for EHDI Excellence** is presented at the EHDI Annual Meeting to honor an individual or group of people who have made a noteworthy accomplishment that contributed to achieving excellence in EHDI programs nationally or in a particular state or region of the country.

#### ANTONIA BRANCIA MAXON AWARD FOR EHDI EXCELLENCE

#### Past Recipients of the Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence

#### 2014 Recipient: Christine "Christie" Yoshinaga-Itano

With deep gratitude for her decades of research on the importance of early identification of hearing loss in infants, I nominate Christine "Christie" Yoshinaga-Itano for the 2015 Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence. She is part of the elite few who have made newborn hearing screening the standard of practice for newborns, worldwide.

The final recommendation by the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force, which affirmed that newborns be screened for congenital hearing loss at birth, recognized the wisdom of those early pioneers who overcame obstacles to make a reality the earliest possible identification of hearing loss. I believe the Task Force recommendation was highly influenced by the research of Dr. Yoshinaga-Itano. Her landmark article, "Language of Early and Later-identified Children with Hearing Loss," published in Pediatrics in 1998, removed any lingering doubts by pediatricians and other professionals that early identification truly makes a critical difference in outcomes for children.

Dr. Yoshinaga-Itano continues to expand her work on developmental outcomes by collecting outcome data on children from birth to three. The data demonstrate that high-quality early intervention services produce improved developmental outcomes in children who are deaf or hard-of-hearing. She is leading an effort to produce national data to document these findings.

As a recipient of the Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence, I acknowledge that, without the seminal research by Dr. Yoshinaga-Itano and her subsequent publications, my own efforts in establishing newborn hearing screening programs would have been far less successful.

She was instrumental in creating the International Conference on Family-Centered Early Intervention Services for Children Who Are Deaf or Hard-Of-Hearing, held every two years in Austria. This venue provides an opportunity for families and professionals from around the world to affirm that families be central in the provision of high-quality early intervention services.

"Christie," an audiologist and deaf educator, was honored by the Academy of Audiology with their Research Award in 2001 and the President's Special Recognition Award in 2008. The entire EHDI community should now applaud and honor Dr. Christine "Christie" Yoshinaga-Itano for her lifetime contributions to early identification of children with hearing loss and support for parents as they begin their journey parenting a deaf or hard-of-hearing child.

## Nominees for the 2015 Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence

#### Julie Beeler

Julie Beeler, Audiology Consultant, University of Tennessee Center on Deafness joined the Tennessee Early Hearing Detection and Intervention team in 2008. Since that time her enthusiasm and leadership has strengthened the collaboration with audiologists, medical providers, the Tennessee Early Intervention System, and parent support through Family Voices and Hands and Voices.

In 2014, she implemented quality improvement training in six regions across the state to reduce lost to follow-up rates. The National Initiative for Children's Healthcare Quality training method on small steps of change was provided to over 70 participants representing hospitals, audiologist, parents, Health Department home visiting programs, Schools of Audiology, and Part C and Non-Part C early intervention providers. More than 30 small steps of change were developed and implemented. Follow-up support by conference call, data monitoring and additional site visits continue.

In an effort to expand follow-up tracking resources, Ms. Beeler developed and implemented a practicum experience for two AuD graduate students from the University of Tennessee Health Sciences, Department of Audiology. The students conduct phone follow-up on babies born in Memphis (a high risk/high lost to follow-up area) who did not pass their newborn hearing screen and whose results had not yet been reported to the state EHDI program. This model will be expanded to another School of Audiology. Ms. Beeler is responsible for developing a network of audiologists that actively participate in the development of guidelines and program improvement.

Ms. Beeler organized a shared equipment loaner program that enabled midwives to conduct otoacoustic emissions screening in the homebirth population and enabled additional audiologists to conduct diagnostic auditory brainstem response follow-up. Julie was instrumental in assisting NCHAM to conduct Early Childhood Hearing Outreach (ECHO) training for all of the Tennessee Early Head Start agencies and Part C Tennessee Early Intervention System (TEIS) districts and as an ECHO trainer for NCHAM.

Julie Beeler played an integral part the establishment of a Hands and Voices chapter in Tennessee and in the transition the Family Voices model of parent support to Guide By Your Side. She has conducted numerous presentations on EHDI 1-3-6, EHDI reporting, and quality improvement to a variety of stakeholders through a variety of organizations and conferences. In addition to her work with Tennessee EHDI, she provides audiology services in a county school.

Julie Beeler has served as the President of the Directors of Speech and Hearing Programs in State Health and Welfare Agencies (DSHPSHWA); on the Board of Directors for Tennessee Hands and Voices; the East Tennessee Interagency Coordinating Council; the UT Knoxville Audiology and Speech Pathology Community Development Board; and the Tennessee Newborn Hearing Task Force

Tennessee would like to recognize the leadership and contributions Julie Beeler has made to EHDI at both the State and National level. Julie will continue to utilize her expertise in networking to improve hearing services in new role with the University of Tennessee Knoxville Health Science Center Audiology & Speech Pathology Department as a Clinical Liaison between the department, the medical community and other partners. We appreciated the dedication she has demonstrated to EHDI.

#### **Diane Miller**

I am pleased to nominate Dr. Diane Miller for the Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence. Dr. Miller has been a constant in the turnover of five EHDI coordinators in our State. Without her dedication in making our State EHDI program stronger and working to make our systems more efficient we would not have the EHDI program we have today. Dr. Miller cares about the kids and the families that are impacted by the work that EHDI does in our state. She has worn many hats in her work with the EHDI program and as an Audiologist for Nevada Early Intervention Services: data collector, training coordinator, community audiologist outreach contact, hospital screener trainer, hospital management outreach, colleague, and very proud to call her my friend too.

Her skills do not end with her office work. She is a part of Nevada Hands & Voices Advisory Board. Dr. Miller also runs the NV Hands & Voices Loaner Bank that lends hearing aids to children in need. In the community she goes out of her way to help provide daycare at our Parent Support meetings, help with community fundraising events to fund our Loaner Bank and High School Scholarships. She loves people, works hard, and always tries to make things better in our state.

When you ask Diane's colleagues at Nevada Early Intervention Services about her, the unanimous response is "she is great". Here is why.

Diane Miller has been the catalyst for the great strides accomplished by Nevada in ensuring that all newborns are screened for hearing loss and receive early intervention services, if needed. Since the creation of the Nevada's EDHI program in 2002, the percent of screening infants for hearing loss has increased from an estimated 40% to 98.90%. Nevada also has witnessed significant improvements in having infants access to appropriate follow-up care. In 2010, there were 14 children enrolled in Part C, Early Intervention. In 2012, the number of children enrolled had increased to 34. Children with hearing loss served by NEIS are now receiving diagnostic and early intervention services closer to 6 months of age. Not so long ago it was closer to their second birthday.

Diane has worked continuously in building collaboratively relationships with health care professionals to provide the resources and tools for hospital staff to communicate effectively with parents to reduce the barriers in refusing hearing screenings. Diane is not only diligent in tracking the screening results but most importantly, is a resource to early intervention staff and parents in explaining and providing specific information.

Diane maintains a good balance between collecting data and improving child outcomes. Diane has exemplary qualities in being compassionate, approachable with any question asked and can provide requested information in understandable, family-friendly terms with real-life examples. Just last week an early intervention provider stated 'We are only able to do our work with Dr. Miller's assistance and mentoring." Diane is willing to go the extra mile for children and their family and motivates others to the same and is the anchor for Nevada's EHDI Program.

#### **Hallie Morrow**

This letter is to nominate Hallie Morrow for the 2015 Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence. Dr. Morrow has been integral in establishing advancing, and refining the largest newborn hearing-screening program in the U.S. (over 500,000 births annually). Hallie has developed a model EHDI program creating a tracking and monitoring system in California that has improved loss to follow-up and ensures that each infant and family is connected to services. She maintains a tireless focus on refining and monitoring the quality of the program she created.

Hallie understands that the community is integral to any hearing screening program and that the state is made of diverse communities with differing challenges. She has developed relationships with local county programs, screening and diagnostic providers, California Children's Services, Public Health Agencies, California Department of Education, Early Start providers, Family Resource Centers, parent organizations and hospitals. Hallie manages an ongoing Quality Improvement Collaborative bringing together stakeholders from the entire state and oversees the state's AAP Chapter Champions efforts to provide educational support to the large primary provider community living in areas from very small and very rural to very large and very urban.

Hallie has made it a requirement that a parent of a child who is deaf or hard of hearing serve as a staff member in the state's Hearing Coordination Centers (HCC) to assisting the tracking and monitoring of babies. Hallie wants to assure a parent friendly process for families. Hallie worked in association with the California Department of Education to procure grant funding to develop the Parent Links program, which ensures ongoing family support.

To ensure comprehensive and consistent reporting of all the hard work done in the state, Hallie worked to advance her program through technology. She assisted in the completion of a multiyear data management system project that allows for the automated upload of demographics and hearing screening results from inpatient providers. The system provides for the tracking and monitoring of infants to assure they are placed with the appropriate care and provides quality indicator reporting to all providers. This allows the state's HCCs to oversee the transfer of patients among hospitals and regions to ensure proper follow up is completed. This is a huge accomplishment and advancement in efficiency for a state that identifies almost 1,000 infants annually with hearing loss.

Hallie is a solid contributor at national and international conferences presenting Information on experiences, building strong EHDI relationships and garnering knowledge from other programs to continue to improve the California program.

Dr. Morrow has created something unique to support the families in California. Through her knowledge, caring and hard work she has been instrumental in creating a program that assures that thousands of infants will receive the care they so richly deserve.

#### Elizabeth Seeliger

The Wisconsin EHDI team nominates Elizabeth Seeliger for the 2015 Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence. As Program Director, Dr. Seeliger has led the Wisconsin Sound Beginnings (WSB) EHDI program since its inception. Along with a strong system of collaborators, she successfully created systems and programs to establish UNHS and reduced loss to follow-up (LTFU) by engaging stakeholders, which included families, health care systems and early intervention programs.

Dr. Seeliger developed a voluntary UNHS system by working with hospitals, midwives and audiologists, resulting in more than 99% of babies being screened each year in Wisconsin. Under her leadership, WSB has reduced LTFU for babies who did not pass their screening by 57% in just three years. She spearheaded the development of a web-based data system, WE-TRAC (Wisconsin EHDI-Tracking Referral and Coordination) to manage, monitor and measure Wisconsin's hearing screening, LTFU and diagnostic rates. She has engineered innovative data exchanges with the state lab of hygiene, vital records, WIC and Early Intervention services, ensuring ease of data entry by its end-users.

Dr. Seeliger is a national leader in the effort to ensure that families who choose Out of Hospital delivery have access to affordable, culturally appropriate UNHS. She engaged and educated midwives, secured funding to purchase OAE screeners, placed ABR screeners with Amish Birth Attendants and championed the effort to create an integrated newborn blood, hearing and heart screening program in Out of Hospital settings.

Dr. Seeliger is a strong believer in family involvement and support. She collaboratively developed programs and materials that have been replicated by others: the Hands & Voices Guide By Your Side Program, Parent Resource Notebook for families of newly diagnosed children, and the web-based EHDI Toolkit. She also serves on the boards of Wisconsin Families for Hands & Voices and Hands & Voices Headquarters. Dr. Seeliger has worked to build a system of care that truly meets families where they are at, developing a team of Regional Outreach Specialists who provide in-home and community screening to families who are experiencing barriers to traditional care and creating culturally sensitive educational materials to be shared with families. She also strives to ensure that the WSB program is learning and growing through participation in conferences, trainings and other opportunities, such as the National Center for Cultural Competence EHDI Community of Learners.

In 2013 Dr. Seeliger completed an Infant, Early Childhood and Family Mental Health certificate program, and co-facilitated pre-sessions on infant/parent relationships at the 2014 and 2015 national EHDI conferences. She has been instrumental in creating WSB's CARES program (Coordination, Assistance, Resource and Evaluation Specialists) to support families and early intervention programs. After Wisconsin's involvement in the early NICHQ Learning Collaborative, she incorporated quality improvement into WSB's work.

Finally she has ensured that Wisconsin continues to collaborate with the NECAP study that will provide additional outcome data.

Dr. Seeliger is a true innovator who has helped Wisconsin become a leader in ensuring that all babies born in Wisconsin are screened, diagnosed and receive timely, culturally appropriate and family-centered early intervention.

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#### **Susan Wiley**

This letter nominates Dr. Susan Wiley for the 2015 Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence. Throughout the years, Dr. Wiley has demonstrated tireless and passionate advocacy for all children with hearing loss. In particular, she has created an environment for positive outcomes for the many children who are deaf or hard of hearing with additional developmental disabilities. This population of children has all too often been left out of the spot light in both the clinical and research realm. Dr. Wiley has pushed the nation to pay special attention in maximizing outcomes for all children, leaving no one out. She forgoes her own personal academic agenda for the agenda of families. In doing so she has made people more confident with children who have disabilities, more open to the idea of embracing children with all levels of ability, and has made the world a better place because of it.

As a developmental pediatrician, Dr. Wiley sits on the Early Hearing Detection and Intervention Advisory Board for the state of Ohio and is the Ohio EHDI Chapter Champion. In this role, she has been instrumental in helping Ohio align with the National EDHI mission and vision. She is a consistent voice of reason and has provided many opportunities for members of the board to think outside the box when it comes to providing the best opportunities for children who are deaf or hard of hearing. Her research and clinical expertise coupled with her personal passion has transformed our current understanding regarding outcomes for children who have additional developmental disabilities. She advocated for children with disabilities to receive cochlear implants when no other institution was willing to do so. She allows families to be comfortable with their communication strategy choices, no matter what those choices are. She has created an environment of acceptance and respect in the field of EHDI and is held in high regard because of it. Her families adore her and her colleagues admire her.

There is not one noteworthy accomplishment, but many bold steps over the years towards challenging and improving our system to be inclusive of all children across all abilities. Susan Wiley embodies the true spirit of the Antonia Brancia Maxon Award in how she approaches work and most importantly in how she approaches life.



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

## Auditory Brain Development: The Foundation of Spoken Communication and Literacy for All Children

This presentation will highlight the pivotal role of auditory brain development in the acquisition of spoken communication for all children, including those who are deaf or hard of hearing. Discussed will be the roles of neuroplasticity, hearing loss, technology, and auditory brain stimulation on central auditory neural maturation. The concept of experience dependent plasticity will be linked with the amount of auditory practice that is necessary to generate and change neural pathways. It's likely that we have substantially underestimated the amount of auditory/linguistic practice time that is actually required to wire and re-wire the brain for high performance. The exciting news emphasized in this talk is that appropriate early and continuing auditory intervention that capitalizes on brain neuroplasticity and auditory technologies, allows for spoken language and literacy outcomes never before imagined for today's infants and children with any type and degree of hearing loss.

#### **Carol Flexer**

The University of Akron, Akron, Ohio

Dr. Carol Flexer received her doctorate in audiology from Kent State University in 1982. She was at The University of Akron for 25 years as a Distinguished Professor of Audiology in the School of Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology. Special areas of expertise include pediatric and educational audiology. Dr. Flexer continues to lecture and consult extensively nationally and internationally about pediatric audiology issues and has authored more than 155 publications. She has co-edited and authored thirteen books. Dr. Flexer is a past president of the Educational Audiology Association, a past president of the American Academy of Audiology, and a past-president of the Alexander Graham Bell Association for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing Academy for Listening and Spoken Language.

#### **Keys to Success: Communication, Commitment, Conviction**

Family support is paramount to the success of any child – and especially so for a child who is deaf or hard-of-hearing. In this talk, Stanford graduate and Rhodes Scholar Rachel Kolb, who was born deaf, shares insights about what can be possible when involved parents seek information and resources, invest in communication and advocacy, and most of all foster the belief that anything is possible for their deaf or hard-of-hearing child. Rachel's talk will share personal experiences of how her family made positive and enduring choices during her early years, thereby enabling her to thrive as a young deaf adult in a hearing world.

#### Rachel Kolb

University of Oxford

A native of Albuquerque, New Mexico who has been profoundly deaf since birth, Rachel Kolb received her B.A. and M.A. in English literature from Stanford University in 2012 and 2013, respectively. Rachel was named a Rhodes Scholar in November 2012 and has since completed a M.St. degree, also in English, at the University of Oxford. She is now pursuing a M.Sc. in education at Oxford, with a focus on accessibility in higher education. Rachel aspires to become a writer, scholar, and public disability advocate; she has blogged and published essays and opinion pieces in venues ranging from the Stanford Daily and Stanford magazine to the Albuquerque Journal and the International Journal of Medical Students. She has also presented at conferences across the country, including TEDx Stanford in May 2013. In her free time, she enjoys writing, equestrian sports, hiking, traveling, trying new foods, and spending time with family and friends.

## Understanding the Game Pieces and Game Changers: Autism and Other Disabilities in Our Children

The definitions and criterion for what constitutes a disability, such as Autism, has evolved over the last 50 years. Likewise, the lives, needs, and resources available to children who deaf or hard of hearing, their families, and those who work with them have also evolved. Despite those evolutions, one constant game piece remains- a recognition of the high incidence and risk for secondary disabilities in children who are deaf or hard of hearing. This presentation will highlight how times have changed in what we know, see and believe to be disabilities such as Autism. Discussions will also reflect on where we are in our understanding of best practices, family impact and engagement, educational decisions, and interventions utilized in the lives and families of children who are deaf or hard of hearing. An emphasis will be made on putting the necessary pieces and ultimately the necessary players together to provide the best for children who are deaf or hard of hearing who have additional disabilities such as Autism.

Laurent Clerk National Deaf Education Center


Christen A. Szymanski, Ph.D. is currently the Director of Research and Evaluation at the Laurent Clerc National Deaf Education Center. As a trained Clinical Psychologist specializing in treatment and behavioral interventions of children with developmental disabilities she has received trainings at Kennedy Krieger Institute, Oregon Health and Science University, and the University of Rochester. Her research focus is on children who are deaf and hard of hearing who also have developmental disabilities such as Autism. In 2012, with collaborators from Gallaudet she published the first ever prevalence study of children with hearing loss and autism. She has traveled nationally and internationally discussing treatment, diagnostic and intervention practices pertaining to deaf children with autism and other disabilities.

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

## State Stakeholders' Meeting

At the 2015 Annual EHDI Meeting, time is provided to help attendees maximize what they learn at the meeting and to use the new knowledge to improve their state's/territory's EHDI system when they return home. In support of individual states/territory, one session has been set aside for attendees to discuss priorities and initiatives for each state/territory. Each state's/territory's meeting will be designed and led by the State EHDI Coordinator or the EHDI Coordinator's designee. This meeting time should be used to benefit the EHDI program, EHDI system, EHDI direct services, and/or the EHDI process as it pertains to your state's/territory's current needs. In the event there are only a few attendees from your state/territory, you might consider partnering with another state/territory.

## **Preparing for the State Stakeholders' Meeting**

Prior to the meeting, participants are encouraged to reflect on the status of their state's/territory's EHDI system and also what they would like to learn from the sessions. Meeting participants may want to review the following items:

- Individual participants are encouraged to complete the Pre-Meeting Individual Reflection and Planning worksheet. The schedule for the meeting and abstracts for all of the sessions are available on the meeting website. This information may be used during any pre-meeting planning meetings or during the State Stakeholders' Meeting session on Monday, March 9th.
- States/territories may choose to communicate among registered attendees prior to the meeting for preliminary planning purposes to discuss priorities and initiatives.
- Preliminary meetings could include introduction of attendees to promote networking among participants from the same state/territory; name, title, role in the EHDI system, topics/sessions of interest at this EHDI meeting.

## **During the State Stakeholders' Meeting**

Monday, March 9, 2015 - 9:15 AM to 10:45 AM.

While State EHDI programs are expected to fulfill similar objectives, strategies for how states/territories fulfill those objectives differ due to a variety of attributes individual states/territories may possess. EHDI Coordinators have been directed to design the agenda for their state's/territory's meeting in a manner that will advance their EHDI priorities, goals, objectives and activities.

The State Stakeholders' Meeting may include introductions, defining EHDI priorities in the state/ territory and devising a strategy for the attendees to gain as much information as possible during the meeting. For example, each state/territory group might review the Meeting Program Book and decide how to coordinate attendance at sessions so that representatives have the opportunity to attend sessions that are most relevant to priorities for their state/territory. In addition, information might be shared about how to use the Personal Action Plan sheets. Each attendee will receive one Personal Action Plan sheet to record some of the most important information that was learned during workshop and plenary sessions (additional sheets available at Registration Desk). The Plan sheets also include a way for each participant to record how this information will be used to continue to enhance the state's/territory's EHDI system.

Note that the Personal Action Plan sheets include a duplicate copy. EHDI Coordinators are encouraged to request attendees to keep the original for themselves and turn in the duplicate copy to the EHDI Coordinator or at the Registration Desk before leaving the annual meeting. Any Personal Action Plan sheets turned in to the Registration Desk will be forwarded to the EHDI Coordinator for that state/territory.






