








Realistic considerations of Snack Time in Preschool





But – when we think of it as "Language with Food", we can facilitate:

- meaningful connections
- new vocabulary opportunities
- complex critical thinking skills
- conversational turns
- natural opportunities for language skill development

How is this a language with food experience?





Let's Make Snack

Typical snack materials

 - Pretzels
- Chocolate chips
 - Licorice
